She spent her last two years in a big open cage without a door, lying on big soft fluffy towels that were changed several times a day, watching the other cats between long, long naps. Happy and content, she loved to be petted, and purred and sometimes would lick a friendly hand in acknowledgment.

Grayson is a big affectionate gray and white fellow who was quickly adopted when he came to Safe Haven as an older kitten. Unfortunately he proved to be an incorrigible sprayer, and a broken hearted family had to return him. At Safe Haven he continued to spray, and fought with other males.

He lives in one of the big "outdoor rooms" on the magic acre, and runs free in the half acre "big yard" with some of the female cats part of each day. He loves to eat, to be petted and to rub his head against his guardian's face.

Lillibel came to Safe Haven many years ago after a pack of dogs injured her and one leg had to be amputated. She loves to chase the many birds that visit the acre, and can run and jump with the best of the others. She must be handled carefully, though, as she will bite if frightened.

But a happier, more contented cat is hard to imagine, for she knows she is safe now.

Zoe, beautiful Zoe, was hit by a car one night and brought to Save Haven almost dead. After extensive veterinary care she survived, but is partially paralyzed. Her back legs are useless and she is completely incontinent. She cannot urinate on her own and her bladder must be manually expressed (painlessly) every 4-6 hours around the clock.

Nothing slows Zoe down, though, and she goes all over the place and can turn up among the squashes or under a rosebush, or asleep on her guardian's bed.

There was also Betty Jo, blind from birth, and now Stevie, almost pathologically shy of strangers – and a sprayer. Also Panuchi, who sprays and must be kept away from Stevie, whom he will attack. And Nell, who is often cranky and will bite her guardian if displeased – she prefers to live outside in the big yard, sleeping on the covered patio in a heated bed on even the coldest nights.

There are many other residents, rescued from PFOA and other places, and no effort is spared to make all their lives as happy as possible. But it is the magic of unconditional love that envelops them all that makes the magic acre a *truly* magical place.

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It is another sad day for PFOA. Beloved Helen Hille, one of our founding members passed away after a valiant battle with heart failure.

Helen was part of our family from the first meeting establishing our organization. She was instrumental in setting up our initial by-laws and was there for every important step along the way. Her quiet intelligent way of getting to the heart of an issue helped us to make good decisions when the way often wasn't so clear.

Helen had a multitude of talents which she graciously and generously shared with us and all of our animal friends. She was computer-savvy long before the rest of us even had answering machines. Helen dragged

us kicking and screaming into the modern age of technology, and her fascination with all things technical continued for the rest of her life. She was a gifted photographer, and her animal pictures graced hundreds of newspaper ads and posters that advertised our "kids" across the Peninsula.

Helen wasn't just about technology though - she was also a loving and compassionate foster mom who took in

dozens of kittens and bottle fed more than one litter. She transported carloads of cats to vet appointments, and for years, took cats to be groomed. Helen adopted numerous cats herself over the years - usually those who had special needs that she felt she would be able to provide with the extra care or expense they required. She sponsored several of our cats, and was always available to help out anonymously when a client needed funding for an emergency.

Helen was there for the animals and she was there for us, as well. The shelter was always supplied with snacks and drinks compliments of her many Costco shopping expeditions. Helen was the first to enthusiastically arrange a birthday party and was at every event (and never empty handed.) Always there when someone needed a hand or just a kind word, Helen rescued stray folks as lovingly as she

took in stray cats. Her generosity funded several PFOA projects, and Helen never waited to be asked - she saw what needed to be done and she stepped up to the plate.

Helen's legacy of compassion and altruism will live on at Safe Haven even though her beautiful, smiling face will be absent. Helen was a gift to the world and to PFOA. She will be missed by us all. •

Joyce Pollack is a relative newcomer to both Safe Haven and Sequim, having relocated from Arizona a mere eight months ago. She has quickly become a valued member of our volunteer family, providing animal transportation as needed, in addition to spending three afternoons a week

as a cat socializer. Her face lights up as she describes traits unique to each furry individual. She seeks out the new arrivals, and the shy kitties still adjusting to bewildering circumstances, and soon has them vying for attention and space in her lap.

Joyce's journey began in Los
Angeles, then meandered throughout
various towns and seasonal resort
employment in Arizona. She met her
husband, Richard Crowell, at the North
Rim of the Grand Canyon. Pets entered
their lives when a neighbor's cat adopted
them. Their next move was to Cornville,
where rural life introduced them to cows
as neighbors. "Interacting with the cows,
and watching cats dream" led to her
involvement with the emerging animal
welfare movement, as she "realized how
entwined we are with animals."

She began volunteering "one day a week, walking dogs and playing with cats. I immediately loved it."

Fostering cats soon followed, as did working for local shelters. At one point, she and Richard converted part of their home into a cattery, as suitable foster homes were scarce. "You have to remember that this was the mid 1980's, and no-kill shelters were considered innovative models for that time." Those early experiences "showed that you can create long term shelter for animals and have a sanctuary with a compassionate environment."

Joyce also began working with developmentally disabled adults around the same time, integrating pet therapy into that job. "My clients enjoy the animals so much." It is work she continues to do.

Their next move, to the Verde Valley, awakened her to the many dangers abandoned cats face. "White cats especially have difficulty surviving in a feral situation, due to their lack of camouflage day and night." The plight of feral cats further influenced her volunteer work, so she whole-heartedly supports TNR (trap/neuter/return) programs.

"PFOA is successful at adopting animals out. It is great to see that support and networking in the community." Tippy and the others at Safe Haven are glad that Joyce provides love and comfort for animals awaiting their forever homes. •

More than anything, Benjamin Wright wanted a kitten for Christmas. At age ten, he was ready for a pet of his own. Although he and his mother lived with his grandparents and he could always enjoy their playful Shih Tzu, Gaby, he had a special love for cats. Nevertheless, when Benjamin expressed his wish to his mother, she said "No." He thought it would take a miracle for her to change her mind.

Benjamin's mother, Andrea, made a promise to herself when her beloved Ragdoll, Tugger, passed away at the age of eighteen: No more cats. He reminded her of Tugger in attitude and temperament, if not in appearance. Nancy said he was alone because he had not yet had his vaccinations. "He doesn't know he's a cat. Like many bottle-fed kittens, he's more likely to bond with humans than other cats."

Whispurr arrived at PFOA as an abandoned kitten when there was no room at the shelter. Still too young to

A Little Too Much Fun for Ginger

"Been hanging from the chandeliers again, has she?" said Dr. Wilcox, laughing at me. Clutching my little soft black Ginger kitty, who suddenly was hobbling, using only three legs, I was scared sick. She loves to zoom around the house trailing ribbons, tumbling rugs, leaping up to race along the top of the walls. At this time she was almost 9

years old but believed she was still a part-Burmese kitten. A favorite fosterling of Janet Harker, one of the cats fortunately rescued when her first home was disbanded and the supposed caretaker kicked her out into a yard full of ferals, she was once shy and retiring. She had blossomed after her adoption, after my beloved Peony died in 2005, into a very strong personality: 2 days after I brought her home she was dominating the household! Bouncy, fizzy, busy, zipping all over the house and outside to the pen every day. But now she could barely walk.

When Dr. Wilcox explained she had torn loose both the anterior and posterior cruciate ligaments in her right rear knee, my heart sank even further. "She will be alright," he assured me. "I can sew her knee back together!"


Three days later she was more than ready to come home after her very successful surgery. Then the fun really began. I had realized she must have slipped when jumping out of the guest room, from the top of the chest onto the top of the wall. Now somehow she had to be restrained from jumping for 6 weeks! So on the way home I bought her a big cage for nighttimes. During the days I would carry her out to enjoy birdwatching on the enclosed porch, which I had carefully prepared to limit her jumping. But of course that first night she evaded my attempt at enclosure: ecstatic to be uncaged

after 3 days in the hospital, she raced gleefully throughout the house, then leaped straight up from the kitchen counter onto the wall and thence onto her high closet shelf retreat while I screamed and wept in fear she would fall or tear her knee again. Eventually, she let me collect her, shakily, and put her to bed. Two days later, the vet had to put her into a collar because she was pulling out her stitches! After the first few panicky days, however, the feisty little thing liked being

> tucked up into her cage when I set it on my desk so she could be beside me, as usual, when I was working in the evenings. Trying to nurse her with the cage sitting on the floor had become impossible when she began upchucking her medications into the collar! (When she repeated the performance the next year with the other knee, we had the proper systems already in place.)

More or less resigned, she healed quickly: by the time the remaining stitches were removed, she was moving quite well and stretching the leg without complaint. Laser treatments enhanced the healing,

and then, freed from confinement, she could again roam the house and venture outdoors to the pen. For some time, she moved more cautiously (about time, cat!), with a slight limp, the right leg still a little stiff. I was saddened by this, but she was not: some months later, her limp was noticeable only when she was quite tired or the weather cold. Now, after 3 years and the second knee surgery, she is only sometimes perceptibly slower! (Then, she gets a small dose of antiinflammatory medication.) A little quieter, even sweeter, not quite as bouncy, nonetheless she still goes "wilding off" and streaks around the house, teasing stolid Gremlin and hassling Jasmine, still ruler of the household—and of me. A very special cat and, always, quite "full of herself." •


