We are committed to keeping these kitties together, no matter how long it takes to find that purrfect home. We recognize that most potential adopters are looking for a single animal. When we bring in a bonded pair, they might be with us for quite some time.

We have dedicated a good deal of space in past issues of *Pet Tidings* to the benefits of adopting more than one cat. Last winter, we celebrated our 2000th adoption with a pair of kittens – Jerry and Perry – two adorable felines from a litter of seven, who bonded as the "leaders of the pack." 
It would be more than a year before someone decided to take a chance on these middle-aged siblings. Many had come to see them, and Gato would meet them at the door, jump in the nearest lap, and snuggle up to be petted. Danielle would hide under a blanket draped across their cat tree. When visitors would try to meet her, Gato would immediately jump up in front of Danielle, protecting her from anyone who attempted to get close to her.

None of this bothered Patricia. "I knew I wanted two cats," she told me recently. "Two cats keep each other company while you're gone – they're very social animals. I knew I was going to be volunteering and be gone a few hours here and there, so I wanted them to have each other."

Danielle and Gato's ages didn't scare her off, either: "I'm older," Patricia explained, "and I don't want to outlive a kitten. I don't want the cat to have to go back to the shelter and find another new home."

When Patricia first brought them to their new forever home, she put their cages in her large bathroom and opened the doors to let them explore little by little and on their own terms. "Danielle was so shy when I first got her home, but of course Gato came out right away, raring to go and taking over the house."


Eventually, Danielle went into hiding under the bed and Patricia said, "At one point Gato finally went under there, and he must have talked to her because she came out



The first garbage day was a real test, and a turning point for Danielle. Patricia said, "Danielle freaked, panicked at the loud noises and ran back under the bed. After the truck was long gone, Gato went around the house looking for her and making little calling noises. He

finally realized she must have been back under the bed, so he crawled under there with her." Patricia said they were





both quiet for a while, and then a short time later they came out together. Just one month later, they are both used to the noise on garbage day and watch out the window at all the activity.

Danielle is slowly coming out of her shell, and is turning out to be a very sweet girl. Patricia notices little signs as the days go by, which show her how much Danielle is starting to trust her. "There was that one day I walked into the bedroom and she was lying on her back on the bed – a very vulnerable position for any animal. I just went over and rubbed her belly, and she didn't mind." Now Danielle follows Patricia around the house and chats with her constantly. She loves to have Patricia brush her, but Gato apparently thinks it's not manly to be brushed. Both are already sleeping on the bed with her at night, knowing that they're safe with their new mommy.

Like any typical brother and sister, they get into little spats from time to time, and soon Gato is licking Danielle's cheek to make up for whatever he did wrong. They also get into licking contests, each kitty licking the other in turn, over and over.

Cats are very sensitive, and Patricia is working very hard to be sure not to set Danielle and Gato back in any way. While they are all still getting to know each other, it's clear that there's already a loving bond between the three. One day Patricia was watching an emotional movie and starting to cry, and the next thing she knew she had a cat in her lap. "I looked down and there's Gato, looking up at me, making sure I'm all right. I told him, 'It's okay, Gato. It's just a movie!"

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# We are Family

Welcome to our merry household composed of six cats, four dogs and me. All but the first of my cats, Bridgette, came from PFOA. The second cat, Big Bubba (also known as Oliver) came long before I became a PFOA volunteer. Years later, but within a few months of each other, came Rosie, Zeke and Isaac (previously Tailspin and Oliver), and then Boone.

The longest-residing cat here is a six-year-old tabby named Bridgette. She had the hardest time adapting to more cats in the house. Bridgette is a medically and temperamentally fragile seven-pound cat, but she's feisty and now holds her own chasing around with the boys. Only Rosie gives her fits.

Next to arrive was eight-yearold big gray Bubba, a 19-pound marshmallow. He welcomes all the new cats with open paws. He shares his chair with each cat that joins him. Bubba will bathe any of the cats or dogs that will let him. He'll continue licking until the subject of his affection finally gets fed up and swats or moves to end the session.

Seven-year-old calico Rosie and I fell in love when I began working in the PFOA office as a volunteer. She came home and began terrorizing Bridgette and Bubba. She ruled the whole house. Rosie has calmed down, but all the cats still give her a wide berth.

Short-haired shiny black Zeke and Isaac came together. These initially

shy brothers now interact positively and energetically with all the other animals. Both love everyone in the family and play hard and high-speed. The amount of noise they now make thundering through the house with Boone is amazing and not for the weak of heart during the night.

Long-haired black Boone came home last. He suffers from cerebellar hypoplasia, also known as wobbly cat syndrome. I know it as super lack of coordination. His disability becomes an asset in other ways. He has absolutely no fear of other cats (including Rosie), or anything else: dogs, people, vacuums. He will explore anything, go anywhere, fail at something, try again, play and wrestle, try to get as close to the hummingbird feeder as possible, scaling the inside of the screen door, and get on counters and knock EVERYTHING off. He will lean against me in the kitchen, fall over when I move and begin again. He is always underfoot, weaving in and out, meowing and hoping for attention or treats. Then he collapses into a long, luxurious nap. Life is a joy to him. All the animals have loved him from day one. I have too.

Add to the above mix four dogs: Rudy, a young shepherd/boxer/pit bull mix, Agnes, an ancient Border Collie, and two older Shih Tzus who live here temporarily while their owners are in a nursing home. Rudy loves the cats and is often the recipient of

She provided us with an organized list of donors and potential suppliers, and we had our first-ever, well-stocked food bank. On top of that, she came up with the idea to organize a PFOA Food Drive, and

obtained buy-in from various stores and veterinary offices who were willing to participate before she presented the complete plan to PFOA. I believe that, at this point, someone back at PFOA's office began shouting about "finding gold!" No, not really. I'm joking there.


But we do turn to her whenever we need those oddfish donations: Pea gravel, windows, you name it, our Golden Girl can find it for us. When Constance and her husband lived in California, she began rescuing abandoned cats: "You see the familiar signs – a litterbox in the garbage bin and then suddenly there's a cat you've never seen before hiding out in the bushes. That's when you know there's someone new to rescue," she says.

She has three rescued kitties of her own who are strictly inside kitties: Junior Pee Wee is 16 years old; Harvey is two years old; and Harvey's mother, Miss Puss, is about four or five years old. Constance gives a lot of credit to her good friend, John Danks, who took in Miss Puss as soon as Constance recognized she was a pregnant stray: "John not only fostered Miss Puss during her last weeks, he kept the kittens and fostered them as well." He then helped Constance find forever homes for Harvey's six siblings.

An avid jazz fan, she volunteers at jazz festivals and takes homemade caramel corn – her specialty – to the musicians as a way of thanking them for sharing their passion and talent. Constance gets around everywhere on her bicycle, and has never owned a car: "I think they're bad for the environment," she says. "I also have never owned a cell phone and I prefer to stay off the Internet."

The kitties and folks here at PFOA don't mind that one bit. Give this woman a good old-fashioned telephone, a pencil and pad of paper and she can work magic! \*

# Vet-Smartz

### ADOPTING TWO - BONDED PAIRS

When it comes to deciding how many pets we have in our homes, sometimes the decision is taken from our hands. A stray cat or dog is found and the relationship just clicks. Voila!! Another pet comes into our lives! The little kitten found in a rainstorm or the dog found in the middle of the road without someone who cares can become our own without planning, but because they need us and warm our hearts and it just feels right.

Other times we think about how many animals to have and we plan which animal will join our families.

We make that purposeful trip to the shelter or we peruse the internet rescue/adoption sites for hours to find the "right" pet for our families. When that happens, lots of things go into our decision - how many pets we already have, temperaments and personalities of the existing pets, family income and discretionary money to feed and care for another animal. These are good

questions and considerations because they mean that we planned for a pet that we could afford and who gets along with the rest of the critters we live with.

Then there are times when we have no pets and decide to bring a dog, cat, gerbil, or rabbit into our family. Studies have been done that show that adopting two pets at the same time is often a great way to make sure that everyone gets along and has a buddy in our homes. Adopting two bonded animals is a great way to save two lives and keep "their" family together. The obvious bond is that of brothers or sisters – littermates – at a shelter or from a rescue group. The two (or more) have been together since birth and they will do better when one of their siblings is with them. Mothers or fathers and one or more of their young ones are another obvious bonding pair. Make sure that they are spayed and neutered

whichever you adopt within the family so that they don't make more little babies.

Another family unit that isn't as obvious is that of friends that may meet as adults, but become very attached in their relationship. This happens when you don't always expect it. Recently an odd pair became well known on the internet. Mr. G is a goat that needed sanctuary when his old home could not keep him. Animal Place – a farm animal rescue in Grass Valley, California – adopted him and took him in. He had a best friend Donkey named



Jelly Bean that Animal Place could not take, so another rescue group took Jelly Bean in. Mr. G moped around, didn't eat and generally did very poorly for a week. Animal Place was afraid he was going to die, so they brought Jelly Bean to their facility. Upon hearing and seeing his dear friend, Mr. G immediately got up, nuzzled Jelly Bean and started to eat. Mr. G has been right as rain ever since.

These two are so bonded that Mr. G didn't feel like living without his friend Jelly Bean. No one realized that they were such a bonded pair.

Sometimes we can only properly care for one new pet, but sometimes there is room in our hearts, homes and bank accounts for two. Consider the love you can share and consider adopting two pets the next time you open your hearts. Two pets are healthier, happier and become play mates so you don't have to do all the playing. PFOA has several such bonded pairs of cats. A recent newsletter told us about several of these bonded pairs that needed to be adopted together. Many rescue groups take in such bonded pairs and try very hard to find a home that can take in both. It can be a difficult task. Take a look wherever you adopt or rescue and remember the old saying that "Two are better than one!"

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# Bertie and Tommy: Best Friends Forever

Bertie Wooster and Tommy Twitch met in the intake room at Safe Haven. They were in separate cages – intake is the only place at PFOA with cages – and really didn't have much to say to each other. As a matter of fact, it was pretty hard to communicate at all. Neither cat could even see the other. Their backgrounds were quite different.

Bertie had been adopted as a kitten from WAIF on Whidbey Island. His adoptive parents adored him, but he



was big and active and terrorized their older cats, who did not want to play with the young orange tornado. Both parents were out of the house all day, and they felt that Bertie needed a lot more attention than they could

provide. Because they really loved the big boy and wanted the best for him, they reluctantly brought him to PFOA to find a new home.

A couple of weeks after Bertie arrived, Tommy was brought in with a group of stray kitties rounded up near Forks to be spayed/neutered and vaccinated. Normally, the feral cats are returned to the area where they were found to live out their lives in familiar surroundings. But Tommy was

different. He was so sweet ... not at all feral. He had lived a totally outside life escaping the attacks of large dogs. He was starving, flea-bitten, and had scar tissue on his belly. His long hair was dull and matted. The volunteers couldn't bear to give him up. So Tommy came to Safe Haven to find a forever home.

After their tour of duty in Intake was over, Bertie and Tommy were moved downstairs to one of the Safe Haven adult rooms, and that's where their friendship blossomed. Having been brought into the "Boyz Only Clubhouse room" at the shelter, the two young cats evidently decided that there is strength in numbers, and they stuck together. They slept close to each other, ate together and played together. It soon became obvious that these kitties were best friends, and could not be separated.

While Bertie and Tommy's friendship was developing, a wonderful couple was struggling to overcome tragedy. They had adopted Maribel Mittens, an affectionate little

tabby kitten who had been diagnosed with FeLV. Maribel had a wonderful home for the last month of her life and her grieving parents were now striving to adjust to life without her. When they were ready, they contacted PFOA for help in adopting another cat.



And then they met Bertie and Tommy.

"It seemed that it would have been unkind to separate these friends," their new mom, Janet, relates. "Although we hadn't intended to bring home more than one cat, when we saw how fondly they played together and how comfortable they were in each other's presence, we knew we had to take both."

These two cats are inseparable. Any time there is a different sound or sudden change, Bertie and Tommy are side-by-side. They find their own playthings and make up their own games. They play for hours with a paper bag or cardboard box. When Tommy had to go to the vet, Bertie was visibly upset, and gave him a thorough sniffing when he returned. Who could have imagined the bond that developed between two unrelated cats who have known each other such a short time! •
