Finding Hannah

One lovely fall day, a beautiful, longhair orange cat was found hiding in an RV at Kalaloch Campground on the Olympic Peninsula of Washington State. She had apparently been living in the remote site for some time before she crawled into the RV. Her coat was matted, she was very thin, and she was terrified.



No one in the campground claimed her, and she had no microchip or other identification, so the camper who found her brought her to Friends of Forks Animals (FOFA). Over the next month she was treated several times for ear mites. She ate sparingly, mostly at night, and was occasionally given an appetite stimulant to encourage her to gain some much-needed weight. FOFA named her Hannah after the young woman who saved her and was so kind to her.

After almost a month of special care, Hannah was able to be brought to Safe Haven. She arrived, traumatized from her experiences, very scared but gentle and friendly. At Safe Haven, we discovered right away that she must have been an

indoor/outdoor kitty, as she really loved her outdoor time. As soon as she was moved to one of the downstairs playrooms, she spent about half her waking hours relaxing outside in her enclosed catio.

In addition to her love of the outdoors, we gradually learned a little more about Hannah. Our veterinarian



Mews from the Board

PFOA lost a wonderful friend, volunteer and supporter with the passing of Shirley McFadden on March 1st of 2024.

We met Shirley and her partner, Pete Grassi, 22 years

ago when they adopted Fergus from PFOA, after losing a beloved kitty. Over the years, Shirley and Pete have been mainstays in our organization, giving generously to our cause and sharing our love of the animals. They helped make possible the purchase of our on-site house, Cozy Cottage, and the renovation of the Caretaker's apartment. Many of the special needs kitties' medical care was subsidized by their donations, and almost every project that we undertook over the years benefited from their contributions. Shirley volunteered in the office every Friday for years and her efficiency, dry humor and kind ways made her a favorite with the staff and volunteers.

PFOA has special members who were instrumental from our beginningfolks who believed in our (then) radically different idea of housing cats in open catteries, spaying and neutering our own and community owned

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estimated that she was approximately eight years old: middle-aged, with many enjoyable years ahead of her. We found her to be a quiet, very loving cat with people she meets, as long as it is a one-on-one situation. She tolerated other cats, but did not actively try to make friends with them. She seemed to be very nervous around small children, and she was terrified of dogs.

Obviously, Hannah's ideal forever home would be a single person or couple with no children and no pets. Especially – no dogs! Safe access to the outside was very important. Many people met Hannah over the next seven months and were struck by her beauty and her gentle manner. Hannah would

come over for a meet and greet, but somehow they didn't quite meet all the requirements. So she would trot back to her outside catio to watch the birds and squirrels, and wait. Perhaps she would find her new forever home tomorrow?

And one sunny day in May, tomorrow came.

A couple of months prior, Helen, a young woman who lived in south Seattle, had seen Hannah in Petfinder, and called the shelter for more information. Not only was she given information about Hannah, the shelter

also gave her some general first time adopter tips. Helen remembers, "I appreciated the personal contact, and also really wanted to meet [Hannah], so decided to go out to PFOA for a visit." She did meet one cat in the adjoining catio who was meowing constantly, trying to attract attention, but after seeing Hannah, she "didn't find it necessary to meet any other cats."



However, someone else had already met Hannah and expressed an interest in her. Helen waited patiently for a couple of months while the prospective adopter met several other cats to determine which one would be a good fit. When

the shelter called Helen to tell her that Hannah was still available, she was ecstatic! This was truly meant to be. As a first-time pet owner, Helen did not have a lot of experience with cats, so before she returned to take Hannah home, she prepared a detailed list of questions about where she was found, health issues, cutting her nails, brushing, toys, and cat trees vs scratching

questions that were very easy

to answer, especially the cat

combination of a post and toys won't do the trick. It needs to be 5-6 tall (at least) and you should put it in front of a sunny window so she can look out. Height is power and safety in the cat world, and a tree with sided sleeping perches or half rounds or tunnels is best. The tree should be in place when you bring Hannah home—it will be her security and provide her with a great place to scratch."

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With answers to all her questions, Helen was able to finalize her Hannah Shopping List. And the

following week, with shopping spree done and all the preparations complete, Helen officially became Hannah's New Mom. She promptly gave Hannah her new name, and reported that Evie was settling in well in her new home – "adjusting with leaps and bounds."

A little over 3 years have now passed. Evie continues to be a great lover of the outdoors. Having started walking on a halter and leash, she

enjoys her outdoor time. In addition, she wears a colorful collar with a bell to alert birds of her presence. Evie's new life is best described by her mom:

"Evie spends her days observing the neighborhood from her cat tree and various windows, snuggling with her mom, and singing, squeaking and talking up a storm. In the summer she loves to walk around the back garden which probably reminds her of her

probably reminds her of her catio days. She knows the sounds of the key in the lock and starts a welcoming serenade before I even unlock the door.

"She is the most gentle and affectionate cat who lives to cuddle, chat and nose bump her favorite humans. Her little pink Kirby toy is her favorite. She loves to throw it and see it fly and hold it captive in her back paws and bat it into submission. Evie is a

sweet little cat and we've quickly become best friends. There is a lot of love between us. She's an incredibly smart, intuitive and loving companion. She's one of a kind!"

Meet a Volunteer: Carol Gearey

This month, we are pleased to introduce you to one of our amazing "potholder ladies," Carol Gearey.

When Carol was getting ready to retire in 2006, she thought, "I need something that's going to keep me busy. Plus, I want to volunteer, *and* help the kitties at PFOA." It all fell together after that.



As with many of us seasoned gals, Carol grew up sewing her own clothes. She was in the 7th grade when she learned to sew on her grandmother's Singer treadle (foot-

powered) sewing machine. When Carol began to contemplate retirement, her friend, Lori, told Carol about a problem her sister-in-law was having: She was struggling with the binding on her own, handmade potholders. Carol jumped in to problem solve the situation. She taught herself

quilting, figured out the binding problem, and then decided that making and selling potholders might be a way for her and Lori to make some money for the kitties.

"We sold them to family, friends, and coworkers, and ended up raising \$800. We took all the unsold potholders and the money to PFOA and suggested they sell them as a way to make money."

Fast forward to 2023, and our potholder crew raised a record \$30,000 for our beloved felines from their now-expanded product line – including potholders, microwave bowls, aprons, tote bags, kitty toys and more!

Carol's other passion began as a result of this potholder project. When she had to learn about quilting to solve that binding problem on those first potholders, her interest kept growing. Her quilting pride hit its peak about a year ago, when she finished a two-year long project: an heirloom, double wedding ring quilt

for a family member. We are all impressed with her talents, as is her 18-year old feline companion, Rory, who regularly quality checks Carol's quilts.

Carol can't believe it's been 18 years since that first batch of potholders were sold. "I remember when we started and I was working on some potholders, and I said, 'I wonder if I'll still be doing this in 10 years.' The time has flown past!"

Are you considering helping our potholder crew with a fabric donation? "I think the best thing for people to donate," Carol says, "is the 100% cotton, solid-colored flannel that's colored all the way through, not just on one side." She's clear about the fabric requirements: "We need 100% cotton," Carol says.

Meet a grrreat pair of kittens: **BUTTERSCOTCH** and **LOUIE!**


BUTTERS ('cause Butterscotch is quite a mouthful) is 'bout seven months old. He's a very, very active,

Vet-Smartz

FINDING GOOD VETERINARY CARE IN OUR TIMES

When we make the decision to have an animal, bird, reptile, or other pet join our households these days, that decision can be a joyous occasion but one that comes with some challenges. Veterinary care is needed for almost every animal that lives in our families. Most people decide to get a dog or cat, but there are also birds, reptiles, insects and little pocket pets like hamsters, gerbils and rats that may be more to some of our likings. Consider getting pet insurance when your pet is young. That makes it more affordable and gives you more financial help and options when they do get sick or injured.

Whatever pet you decide to adopt, one important decision is where to get health care for our pets.

Ever since the COVID pandemic, veterinary clinics have gotten more busy and more expensive. The best way to have good veterinary care is to find a clinic or a veterinarian who communicates well with you and who you can afford. Having a preexisting and good relationship with a clinic or doctor helps you to get ahead in the queue if they are busy, and may help you if you need to get creative to afford any care that is needed. I think communication with a veterinarian can be as important as their skills in surgery or in medicine. You want someone who will listen to you first and then communicate what your pet needs at a level that you feel comfortable with.

Sometimes when you need help, the clinic is so busy that they cannot help you in a timely manner, so other options are to know the other clinics and doctors in your area. If one cannot get you in, try calling another. There may be veterinarians in your area who are independent and do house calls. There may be lower priced clinics or clinics with payment plans that can help with expenses. I find options like talking to your neighbors and friends or going on

Next Door or Facebook may help you find other health care veterinary options. I have found that sometimes going to another town within driving distance can help find a clinic that can take you. Of course, there are emergency clinics, but you need to be prepared to spend more money there, just as emergency clinics in human medicine are more expensive.

Other options that can help financially are programs like Care Credit and Scratch Pay which are available at some clinics. These help with credit programs to spread out payments. Talking to your veterinarian about treatment options can help. Sometimes there are less expensive treatment options for some conditions that can help your pet.

If you are lower income, there are some programs out there to help with expenses. Programs like PAWS in Bremerton, Spay to Save in Clallam County and Pet Helpers in Port Townsend can provide some financial relief if you qualify for their programs. For spays and neuters there are several low-income options – Humane Society of Jefferson County, Center Valley Animal Rescue and Kitsap Humane Society are some.

Be patient and get in line for spays and neuters. You may need to wait for your turn, but the prices are affordable for those who need that help.

Prevention is so very important. Feed a good quality diet. Get vaccinations that can prevent some diseases. Do not let your dog or cat roam the neighborhood without you. Dogs need to be walked on a leash and cats are much safer if they do not go out unattended. Cats and dogs get hit by vehicles, get in fights with other animals and can find things to eat that are not healthy. If you must budget for veterinary care, at least lessen the risks of your animals needing expensive health care.


best friend (aside from my husband, of course). Hubby says we're "thick as thieves".
