ORCHID'S OVERTURE

n the spring of 2019, Peninsula Friends of Animals was contacted by an animal welfare group who had discovered a serious hoarding situation. Among the animals were a large number of cats who needed veterinary care, grooming, and a safe place to stay until they could be adopted. PFOA volunteered to take nine of the cats.

When the cats arrived in June, we discovered that most of them were semi-feral to feral—definitely not immediately adoptable. Fortunately, our rescue and adoption center, Safe Haven, has a large pole barn building next to the main shelter, surrounded by a large, completely enclosed catio and play yard. It has served as the temporary home for a number of our feline residents waiting to go to their forever homes. It was perfect for the newly-arrived group, quickly renamed the Pole Barn Nine. Volunteers and Staff worked to socialize them, and were successful with a few of the semi-ferals. Within a year, two of them, Garland and Rhodes, had each found a home of their own. A third member of the Pole Barn Nine, Orchid, was adopted a year later. This is her story, told by her human mom, Lindsey.



After losing our dear elderly kitty to kidney disease in 2021, my

husband Jon and I fostered dogs for a couple of months before realizing we really missed having a quiet cat family. We fell in love with Orchid's photo on Peninsula Friends of Animals' website and put in an application for her. On our first visit at PFOA, she was sleeping in her cat tower, then jumped down and went outside to

Mews from the Board

On December 18, 2024, Peninsula Friends of Animals and the Olympic Peninsula animal rescue world lost one of its brightest stars. Ann Gilson, a founding member of PFOA, crossed the Rainbow Bridge less than a month before her 98th birthday.

Ann lived life on her own terms. She entered college at age 16, and after graduation, she taught in a one-room schoolhouse in northern New Mexico. During WWII she earned her pilot's license, met and married Earl Gilson and moved around the country with Earl and their two sons.

Shortly after Earl retired from the Air Force, Ann earned a Master's degree in Library Science. She retired as head librarian at the University of Wisconsin, and later moved to Port Angeles, accompanied by the numerous cats she had rescued. She designed and built her home, "The Magic Acre," to accommodate as many cats, especially special needs kitties, as possible.

The last three+ decades of Ann's life were dedicated to animal rescue, and she worked tirelessly in support of our organization. Although she focused her efforts primarily on cats, she also rescued dogs and other animals. We once spayed a pig! She was elected to the first Board of Directors of PFOA, and served as Director for over 16 years, retiring in Spring of 2017. She was the editor of Pet Tidings for more years than she cared to remember. In her 70's, she came up with the idea, and financed PFOA's highly successful (and somewhat controversial) nude calendars. And she posed for the first one!

We remember Ann with gratitude for her generosity and dedication to animal rescue, and rejoice that she is now reunited with the many cats she has loved. - *Board of Directors, Peninsula Friends of Animals*

Once Orchid became comfortable, she started to show just a tad of a mischievous side. She loves to shred Kleenex tissues, so we now keep the tissue box upside down. Another favorite is paper on the floor, which I discovered during a paper filing project. Other than that, she is the most wellbehaved cat we've ever had. She is still wary of loud noises (the UPS truck is the loudest) and is afraid of strangers. She has four people in her inner circle, including my mom, who commissioned the portrait of Orchid shown here. Four humans seems to be enough for her, and it works out well for us, as we have a very quiet household with no children and no other pets. She likes being the queen of the castle and we like indulging her!

Orchid has a lot of fun mannerisms and is a joy to interact with. She gets very spunky at times and throws her toy mice around the living room so she can chase them. She gets the zoomies and runs

around the house in a blur. She hunts her favorite toys at night and places them at the foot of each of our favorite chairs in the living room. She's still not sure about sleeping in the human bed, but once or twice a year I'll wake up with her next to my head. Every evening, we have "treat time" where we toss her treats



across the living room for her to "hunt." Jon built her a beautiful catio which she very much enjoys, complete with multi-level shelves, ramps, and cat grass to munch on. We also have a bird feeder suctioned to our living-room window with stairs for her to jump onto the windowsill for birdwatching.

Orky and Jon have a special bond which took over two years to develop. Apparently, Orchid hadn't been around very many men because she was pretty terrified of him for the first year. He was very patient with her

and after slow, increasing levels of exposure, she would tolerate pets from him, let him sit near her, and take treats from him. Now, on any given day she'll choose Jon's lap to snuggle in over mine. She'll walk over to him and prance and show him her butt, which means, "pet me now!"

We're so very grateful to Peninsula Friends of Animals for trusting us to care for Orchid. She's the most beautiful, snuggly, fun cat we could have ever asked for. Although we've had to overcome a lot with her fearfulness, we're thrilled we could provide a safe home for her where she can enjoy a life filled with love. 🛣

Ask PFOA: Legacy Gifting

Peninsula Friends Of Animals is grateful for your dedicated support of our rescue, rehoming and spay/neuter mission.

Over the last 25 years, we have rescued and rehomed thousands of needy cats of all ages and still care for a number of small breed, senior foster dogs with behavioral or physical challenges. We are able to do this vital lifesaving work because of you, our devoted supporters.

If continuing this support after your lifetime is important and dear to your heart, there are various ways you can ensure your personal and philanthropic goals.

Many animal advocates will utilize their will to support these causes. A will can help secure your future, the future of your loved ones and the future of the causes that you want to continue to help through a legacy gift.

To make sure that you and your loved ones are taken care of, it is best to consult with a professional to help you draft your will. We can suggest some wording to include PFOA as a beneficiary.

A remainder bequest, for example, gives the remainder of your estate to PFOA after all other bequests have been distributed. If you already have a will and want to add a charitable gift to PFOA, you can utilize a codicil, which lets you add or make changes to an existing will. You can add PFOA to receive a remainder amount, a percentage of your estate's total value or a specific dollar amount. Another way to honor your last wishes is through a life insurance policy that includes PFOA as a named beneficiary.



You can also leave a gift through a beneficiary designation. You can designate funds in accounts like savings, checking or CD's to pass on to PFOA after your lifetime. This is called Transfer on Death (TOD) or Payable on Death (POD) and whoever you name as beneficiary will receive any assets in the account.

You may want to consider a tax free gift from your IRA. An Individual Retirement Account is an effective means to place money aside for your retirement, and after you have taken care of yourself and your loved ones, you may consider a qualified charitable distribution (QCD) to help PFOA care for future generations of rescues.

At age 70 and a half, you are eligible to make a QCD directly from your IRA to a non profit, tax exempt charity like PFOA, up to \$100,000 if transferred directly from your account to PFOA. The amount you give will not be subject to federal income tax. If you're required to take a minimum distribution (RMD), you may also give all or part of your RMD as a QCD and the amount you give will not be subject to income tax.

Talk to your financial advisor to determine if the type of charitable gift is an option for you. And read the following testimonials that recognize the importance of legacy giving.
